

Fall Semester 2023 Upper- Level Courses by Language

Chinese

CI 201: Chinese Composition and Conversation

Increases students' oral and written proficiency through assimilation of advanced structural patterns and stylistic analysis through communicative exercises and activities.

CI 303: Selective Readings in Modern Chinese

Readings in modern Chinese at the advanced level. Texts include literary selections, newspaper articles, and scholarly essays.

French

FR 201: French Composition and Conversation I

Develops writing and speaking ability in French through models of style, related grammar, and composition exercises. Comprehension and speaking are built from authentic documents and other developing technologies.

FR 303: France Today

A study of the evolution of France since 1980 with emphasis on political, social, intellectual, and artistic issues. Includes various analyses of the role of France on the international scene and particularly as a member of the European Union. Students study articles drawn from the French press, recent films, and current French television news.

FR 332: Trauma and Testimony

Examines representations of the 1994 genocide of the Tutsis in Rwanda in a variety of literary genres (autobiographical testimony, novels, short stories, poetry, essays, and graphic novels), as well as the visual media (film, interviews, and photos). Students examine how the particularities of each genre allow authors to testify of trauma in different ways.

Italian

IT 201: Italian Composition and Conversation I

Students develop their ability to write and speak correctly and creatively in Italian through models of advanced linguistic structural patterns, related grammar, examples of usage, and composition exercises. Oral practice enhanced through the use of videos

Spanish

SN 201: Spanish Composition and Conversation

Increases students' oral and written proficiency through assimilation of advanced structural patterns, stylistic analysis, discussion of contemporary topics.

SN 203: Intro to Reading Literature

Transition from SN201 to advanced classes. Develops reading skills with emphasis on class discussion and new vocabulary. Introduces Hispanic literature: basic terms, genres, detailed analysis, and themes. Works include novellas, plays, short stories, poems.

SN 307: Contemporary Spanish Civilization and Culture

Examines the historical, political, and cultural aspects of Spain from the death of Dictator Francisco Franco in 1975 to the present. Students are given an insight into Spain's cultural diversity and the Spanish way of life through readings in contemporary history, politics, and culture as well as contemporary film and music. Students consider such topics as Spain's transition to democracy, the cultural boom of the 1980s, and the current importance of regional politics.

SN 362: Origin Contemporary Spain 1898-1920

Examines the various responses among Spanish writers to the loss of the last colonies after the war of 1898 and the paradoxical entrance of Spain into the twentieth century. Focuses on the major intellectual trends in Europe and the Americas which influenced radical changes of style and structure in the narrative, poetry, and theatre of the period. Readings include works by Miguel de Unamuno, Pío Baroja, Ramón María del Valle-Inclán, Azorín, and Antonio Machado.

SN 382: Women Against Current Latin America

Discusses important events in the recent history of four Latin American countries (Mexico, Ecuador, Guatemala, and Uruguay) as reflected in the personal histories and testimony of women. In the case of Ecuador and Guatemala, the focus is on the experience of Quichua and Mayan women in their struggle to overcome the discrimination encountered in many aspects of their lives, including the family, the community and the larger political arena. The cases of Mexico and Uruguay offer the opportunity to examine two important political events in the history of these two countries: the struggle against the dictatorship in Uruguay and the social impact of widespread violence in Mexico in recent years. Both cases are recounted from the perspective of imprisoned women who have spoken about their lives and dreams.

Modern Language Courses

ML 392D: Intro to Latin American and Latino Studies

A study of Latin America and Latino issues in the United States, with history and culture being of primary concern to determine how identities and nations are constructed and how they interact with each other. Students are encouraged to view these diverse realities through the lens of their major discipline.

ML 405: Modern Languages and Literatures Internship

Students work with an instructor to carry out a supervised internship in the fields of immigration, health, policy and public service, law, sustainability, development, business, or other area where international language skills and cultural competence are in high demand. Special emphasis given to professional preparation; training in cultural sensitivity toward differences of culture, ethnicity, national origin, race, religion, gender identity, and age; and discernment.

ML 426: The Teaching of World Language

Addresses the teaching guidelines and the expectations established by the American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Languages (ACTFL) and the World-Readiness Standards for Learning Languages. Students examine current methodologies, techniques, and educational goals for the teaching of world languages. Throughout the course, students develop lessons and activities that support an integrated world language program. Students also observe and evaluate world language classes. Students may also have opportunities to participate in classroom teaching. Maryland Core Learning Goals and Outcomes are introduced and reinforced along with the Interstate Teacher Assessment and Support Consortium (InTASC) standards
