A writing internship will help you achieve your goals, whether they involve graduate school or life in the professional world.

WR402 is a 3-credit class, which requires a total of 150 hours, just like any other class. For this class, however, you'll work 120+ hours with your site, with the remaining hours spent, essentially, on some reading, reflections with the class, and compiling your portfolio. The class is conducted, for the most part, online.

Many successful writing alumni had internships in their junior and senior years, and some were even hired right after graduation.

You may intern at organizations like *Baltimore Style*, Maryland Nonprofits, Bancroft Publishing, the NAACP, or DoublePositive Online Marketing. We have a long list of additional options, or you may find an organization on your own.
