

Messina-Honors Program Pilot Mid-Year Survey

February 19, 2013

I Overview

45 students participating in the 2012-13 Messina-Honors Pilot Program were invited to participate in a web survey to assess how they experienced Messina during the fall semester. The survey was developed in consultation with the Messina Advisory Board and the Honors Program faculty. In addition, the Office of Institutional Research reviewed and offered suggestions to improve the survey instrument before it was sent to students. Questions were designed to correspond to the four main areas of Messina learning outcomes – Discernment, Critical Thinking, Community and Integrated Learning (see Appendix A for complete list of Learning Outcomes). An additional set of questions also addressed usage of Hillside area facilities.

The survey was conducted from January 23, 2013 – February 11, 2013. Overall, 21 students completed the survey. All three class sections were represented (at least six students in each section responded) and the reported gender of respondents was consistent with the composition of the Honors program first year students (14 women, 6 men, 1 preferred not to share). Before taking the survey, students were reminded of the various components of the Messina experience:

- The Human Drama seminars taken by First-Years in both the fall and spring semester
- Enrichment hours and activities connected to the Human Drama course
- Academic advising, specifically having your first semester seminar professor as your academic advisor
- Living in proximity to your Human Drama classmates in Flannery O'Connor Hall
- Theme-wide events (Homer and pizza, NYC trip) including events designed to familiarize you with Baltimore
- Plenary lectures held in the residence hall
- Connections with Student Development administrators and Student Peer Leaders/Evergreens through enrichment activities

II Summary of Findings

- Community: Students reported Messina "often" to "very often" helped them develop a sense of belonging to Loyola. Developing relationships with peers and faculty were rated highest among survey responses. Overall, students felt Loyola was a positive environment and felt Messina supported them in their academic and social pursuits.
- Critical Thinking: Students report that they felt supported in their academic coursework and
 decision making. Students report that Messina helped them develop better relationships with
 faculty and classmates and aided in developing critical thinking skills such as becoming a better
 writer. They also felt that their peers contributed to their learning. They reported little use of

campus resources that aide critical thinking (e.g., Writing Center, Tutoring); this finding is likely attributable to the fact that the pilot is exclusive to Honors students.

- Discernment: Students "sometimes" or "often" thought about their decision-making and career choices. Furthermore, most students report that Messina helped them to start thinking "a little" about the Jesuit tradition of discernment. Means regarding reflection activities such as prayer ranked lower among response means.
- Integrated Learning On the whole, students did not feel a strong connection to the theme "Self and Other" in their Messina experience. This may be attributed to the lack of residential programming to the theme throughout the semester. In addition, the Honors students did not have to commit to a theme in order to be in the course. A more thorough assessment of theme connections should be done next year when all students living in Flannery O'Connor participate in Messina and its three themes Self and Other, The Visionary and Stories We Tell.
- Hillside Facilities & Amenities The Flannery O'Connor large floor lounges, free newspapers and use of the library and library resources rank highest in regards to usage.
- Overall, students felt positive about returning to Loyola for the spring semester and for future years.

III Qualitative Responses

Students also shared a variety of qualitative comments regarding their Messina experience. The following is a subset of the responses:

Biggest lessons learned during the first semester:

- "My first semester at Loyola and my participation in the Messina Honors Pilot program taught me a lot. I think something that I really took to the heart was the lesson of discernment and the need to take a step back from our busy lives and reflect. Being a part of the Honors program also allowed me to both find and feel a part of a smaller community. I was able to establish really close relationships with both my peers and my teachers. I feel that the program also allowed me to begin to find my place both at Loyola and in the greater community."
- "I felt like I was able to establish a closer relationship with my professor as a result of the program. I also found that I was able to reflect more effectively and often as a result."
- "How to write more effectively and concisely How to manage time and schoolwork more efficiently"
- "1)There can be a balance between school, friends, service, etc. 2)Everyone has a tough time at some point in their first year, so it is important to create strong friendships and ask for help when you need it."

Are there topics you wish had been discussed during the enrichment hour time that would have helped you? Are there topics or conversations that you would like to see take place during the spring semester?

- "I think more discussion about the actual theme "Self and Other" would be very beneficial. To be honest, I only recently found out that was the theme for this year. I feel strongly that there could have been very dynamic and interesting discussions focusing on this idea."
- "I feel like we should have done more of the team building activities from the start. When we discussed how school is going for us and activities we are in, we enjoyed it the most. It was nice when we got off campus together or cooked together because those helped build a strong class dynamic. It was great to discuss our lives with one another...that was the most helpful part of it and I wish we had done that sooner. Classes on time managment and getting involved were boring and useless to us. We have a lot of class time so just being together and sharing time together outside of class really helped our in class comfort and depth of discussion. We began to feel more comfortable as we got to know each other better through the enrichment hours."
- "During the first weeks of the year, it would have been helpful to have been instructed how to
 utilize moodle and inside loyola, esp. when considering the limited time there was to join clubs
 and teams etc."
- "I think a career talk is order and would be very beneficial."

What advice do you have for next year's first year students about Messina and life as a first year student?

- "That it is a time commitment outside of class, but it really does enhance the classroom experience. Coming to college is not simply about getting the best education that you can from your classes, it is also about finding yourself. The Messina program allows you to be tested academically while also finding who you want to be through interactions with peers. The first year class should always remember that they are going through this college experience with a community of peers and staff--they don't ever have to stand alone in this new journey."
- "Don't sign up for all your classes on the same day. Get involved with one extra-curricular immediately and then slowly add others. Don't waste time fake studying in groups. I've learned an inconceivable amount in one semester through classes and socially adjusting."

- Demonstrate a sense of belonging to the community at Loyola University both in and out of the classroom.

Integrated Learning

• Integrate multiple sources of knowledge gained through various disciplinary lenses, texts, instruction, out of class experiences and personal reflection to offer a perspective on the interdisciplinary theme of the community.

Note: The learning outcomes listed above incorporate current goals of the Alpha program and FE 100 and the AAC&U's VALUE: Valid Assessment of Learning in Undergraduate Education. In addition, Terra Schehr, Assistant Vice-President for Institutional Research and Effectiveness was consulted to ensure that the outcomes could be measured. An assessment plan will be developed over the next year to assess progress for these aims as well as to gather evidence of individual student learning after their first year at Loyola.
