Fall 2014 Mid-Year Student Survey Findings January 21, 2015

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Overview

1113 students¹ participating in Messina and Loyola 101 during the Fall 2014 semester were invited to participate in a web survey to assess their overall first-year experience and their participation in a first-year program at Loyola University Maryland during the fall semester. The survey was developed in consultation with the Messina Advisory Board and was submitted for Institutional Review Board for approval (FWA00013527) before it was sent to students. Questions were designed to correspond to the four main areas of Messina learning outcomes – Discernment, Critical Thinking, Community and Integrated Learning (see Appendix A for complete list of Learning Outcomes).

The survey was conducted from December 1, 2014 – January 4, 2015. In total, 489 students began the survey and 224 students fully completed the survey. Data represents the following themes and identities:

- 329 Messina students began the survey, 273 students finished the survey. 87 Loyola 101 students began the survey, 67 students finished the survey.²
- Among Messina respondents, 135 (41.15%) respondents represented Self and Other, 106 (32.31%) respondents represented Stories We Tell, 87 (26.52%) respondents represented The Visionary.
- 104 (30.49%) respondents identified as men, 234 (68.62%) respondents identified as women.

Summary of Findings

Loyola 101 and Messina students were asked a variety of fixed-response questions related to their fall semester experience and their involvement in their respective programs. In questions related to the Fall Semester Experience, students were asked to rank how often they engaged in or thought about a variety of personal, academic, and social activities during their first semester.³ Students also responded to a follow-up question regarding the level of importance each area was to them.⁴ A second set of questions related to the student's sense of belonging at Loyola, both within and beyond Messina.⁵ In questions related to the Messina Experience, students were asked to respond to how much their participation in Messina helped them to do or think about different aspects during their first semester.⁶

Jesuit Mission and Values

- 274 (89.84%) students indicated that they "Agree or Strongly Agree" with the statement that they examined values and principles involved in their own decision-making processes.
- 128 (40.76%) students indicated that they spent quiet time in reflection "Often (monthly) or Very Often (weekly);" however, 254 (80.89%) students indicated this is an area that is "somewhat to very important" to them.

Critical Understanding

- Students continue to value study groups with their peers- 257 (n=313, 82.11%) respondents did this at least once during the fall semester. Additionally, the majority of students also found additional resources for course assignments.
- When asked how participation in Messina contributes to understanding learning strategies that are most personally effective, student responses were mixed. Students seem to still be figuring out the strategies that best work for them. With that, students seem to be open to enrichment sessions that continue to explore strategies that contribute to academic success.
- 279 (91.48%) indicated that they "Agree or Strongly Agree" with the statement that they have found support in regard to completing academic coursework.

Connections to Loyola Community

- Messina students have strong connections with all members of the working group- particularly their Evergreens. 290 (95.08%) indicated that they "Agree or Strongly Agree" with the statement that they established a positive relationship with their Evergreen.
- 235 (77.30%) students indicated that they "Quite a Bit or Very Much" have developed close (meaningful) relationships with at least one other student at Loyola through their participation in Messina.
- Through enrichment sessions, students have been getting acclimated to various aspects of the Loyola Community. The top five meaningful enrichment hour topics from the fall were sessions related to campus resources/transition issues, discernment/reflection, stress management, off-campus travel and selecting classes/understanding core requirements.
- Compared to Loyola 101 responses, students in Messina reported having a higher sense of belonging at Loyola and felt a stronger sense of support in regards to academic coursework.

Integrated Learning

- 287 students (n=313, 91.69%) attended at least one campus lecture as a part of their Messina class. Additionally, 208 students (66.45%) attended at least one campus lecture on their own this semester, not as a part of a class requirement.
- 268 (87.87%) students "agreed or strongly agreed" with the statement that they "used knowledge and skills discussed or developed in classes to contribute to their understanding of content in other classes.

Other Observations

- Similar to Fall 2013 responses, students indicated that they spent quiet time in reflection less frequently during their personal time; however, this is an area that is somewhat important to them.
- A little over half of the respondents sought tutoring service at least once this semester. This area had a higher degree of importance for students compared to Fall 2013 findings.
- Compared to Loyola 101 responses, students in Messina reported having participated less in campus activities (including clubs, organizations, sports or service). It should be noted that this semester, the majority of our first-year student athletes participated in Loyola 101 which may have contributed to a higher response.
- Students that had the chance to experience aspects of Baltimore during their enrichment hours highly valued that opportunity. Students also indicated an appreciation for sessions that presented information on how to navigate Baltimore neighborhoods on their own. Students who did not have had the same off-campus opportunities desire more chances to explore the city and the surrounding areas together in the spring.

Select Responses to Open-Ended Questions⁷

Topics You Wish Would Have Been Covered in the Fall:

- "I think just adjusting to college more, maybe more advice about being a first year. For example, time management and eating better to avoid the freshman 15."
- "Most of our sessions were just general reflections of the week with no guidelines, and I wish the reflections and discussions had more of a theme to make it more meaningful."
- "I am unsure if this is in fact something that messina tries to cover, but navigating the social scene would be extremely beneficial to talk about. not just the choices with alcohol, we already hear a lot about that, but just student to student relationships in general. everybody talks about meeting new people and friends before the semester starts, it is definitely on lots of peoples minds."
- "I wish my class could have talked about Baltimore more and the greater community. It would have been fun to get out of the classroom more and explore."

Lessons Learned During the First Semester:

- "It's absolutely necessary to take a step back and reflect on the changes and situations going on around you. The first semester of college is filled with tremendous change and varying emotions, so it's important to take time for yourself away from the madness and reflect."
- "To always be open in learning and understanding others opinion. I enjoyed the discussions with my peers. I very much enjoyed the sponsored events with my peers, such as going to the museum and theatre. It is nice that the Messina programs helps you get to know Baltimore, people should get to know their surroundings, Messina should keep those types of events."
- "I have learned that it is important to speak up during class when I have something to say. I have always been quiet, but sometimes raising a question or stating an opinion or belief can spark a really interesting conversation. It's also not like high school where you are basically only graded on tests and quizzes; participation is really important, and makes class much more intriguing."
- "I learned that I am not alone on campus and that I have a multitude of people (my Messina instructor, my mentor, my Evergreen) who care about me and who want to see me succeed. I also learned that I can rely on these people to help me make decisions about my future and that they can give me very pertinent advice."

How You Would Describe Messina to an Incoming First-Year Student:

- "Messina is a system that is committed to giving freshmen a good first year experience. The small class size also allows you to get to know your classmates better as well as giving you the opportunity to have frequent one-on-one conversations with the professor. An Evergreen is a valuable resource as that individual is also a current student, and can show you the ins and outs; of the university from another student's perspective."
- "An amazing way to reflect on your experiences week by week. It's also a great way to make 10-15 friends right off the bat that you open up to and that open up to you in the Messina setting. It made my first experience significantly better."
- "Messina is a way to learn more about yourself and it gives you numerous chances to improve yourself and increase your understanding of various topics which, while they may not relate to you directly, may still relate to your life and your position in society."
- "Messina is a program of classes that usually tend to help you fulfill your core requirements. Personally, since I was with my Messina group since the beginning of the year, I've become close with them. But Messina isn't just two classes that help you pass, but it also works to integrate lessons to better your own life. You learn how to communicate better with others, manage your time, cope with stress and peer

pressure, and it also betters your understanding of Baltimore and the world outside the small Loyola campus."

Examples of Messina Responses- Common Themes (n=12):¹⁵

- *Disconnection to Loyola, Negative Transition:* Those who feel disconnected to Loyola mentioned being uncomfortable with their advisor also being their faculty member, a lack of belonging with their peers and being dissatisfied with campus event offerings.
- *Connection to Loyola, Positive Transition:* Those who feel connected to Loyola indicated this being due to their Evergreen and getting involved on campus.
- *Other Observations:* A respondent pointed out that their section was negatively affected by those students who did not want to be in the program. Another student indicating a wish for more Baltimore exploration during the enrichment session time.

Examples of Messina Responses- Common Themes (n=24):¹⁶

- *Negative Observations:* Topics in this area ranged from thoughts of transferring out of Loyola, dissatisfaction with having to continue enrichment sessions in the spring, general worry about the academic rigor of next semester or unhappiness with their course schedule.
- *Positive Observations:* Topics in this area ranged from looking forward to their course schedule, feeling the support of the community or interest in extracurricular activities scheduled for the spring.

- "Messina is a system that is committed to giving freshmen a good first year experience. The small class size also allows you to get to know your classmates better as well as giving you the opportunity to have frequent one-on-one conversations with the professor. An Evergreen is a valuable resource as that individual is also a current student, and can show you the ins and outs of the university from another student's perspective."
- "An amazing way to reflect on your experiences week by week. It's also a great way to make 10-15 friends right off the bat that you open up to and that open up to you in the Messina setting. It made my first experience significantly better."
- "Messina is a first-year program where you live near students in one of your classes. For Messina, you have enrichment hours after class where you gain knowledge on time management skills, the Baltimore area, diversity, and your core values. In addition, your professor and Evergreen as well as your coordinator take you on trips to interesting places thereby broadening your horizons and knowledge of Baltimore."
- "Messina is the ideal program to be involved in as a first-year. There is a certain bond that happens
 between kids in the same Messina class that creates a small family in the group. It makes the transition to
 college so much easier, especially when it comes to academics. Not only that, but you experience people as
 real people instead of just a kid you know from your math class. You know your classmates faces and names
 and stories and dreams and they know yours. There is an incredible bond and it really is the best program a
 first-year would want and need."
- "Messina is a program where you become close with a professor and a faculty member and upperclassmen on campus who are there to help make your transition to college go smoothly. You also forge strong bonds with your classmates because you see them every week as well as living near them. This living-learning community helps foster a sense of belonging and acceptance at the school that makes your transition to college go that much more smoothly."
