

# **Messina Spring Semester Survey Findings**

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#### Overview

664 students participating in Messina during the Spring 2015 semester were invited to participate in a web survey to assess their first-year experience and how they experienced Messina during the spring semester. The survey was based off of a similar survey administered in Spring 2014 that was developed in consultation with the Messina Advisory Board. In addition, the survey was submitted for Institutional Review Board for approval (FWA00013527) before it was sent to students. Questions were designed to correspond to the four main areas of Messina learning outcomes – Discernment, Critical Thinking, Community and Integrated Learning (see Appendix A for complete list of Learning Outcomes).

The survey was conducted from April 20, 2015 – May 18, 2015. At its completion, 259 students began the survey and 209 students fully completed the survey. Almost all 26 sections of Messina were represented in the survey. Data represents the following themes and identities:

- 116 (49%) respondents represented Self and Other, 59 (25%) respondents represented Stories We Tell, 64 (27%) respondents represented The Visionary. (*n*=239)
- 52 (26%) respondents identified as men, 147 (74%) respondents identified as women.

At particular points of the survey, students were reminded of the following components of the Messina experience:

- The enrichment session is the time you spend with your Evergreen, Mentor, and/or Professor.
- The Messina class is the time you spend with just your Professor.

# **Summary of Findings**

Students were asked a variety of quantitative and qualitative questions related to their spring semester Messina experience. In questions related to the Messina Spring Semester Experience, students were asked to respond to how much their participation in Messina helped them to do or think about different areas during their second semester.<sup>1</sup>

- Students were asked to list the two spring enrichment sessions of value to them and then to indicate which
  Messina Learning Outcomes they felt the sessions related to. All learning outcomes were indicated as being
  incorporated, with Connections to the Loyola Community and Jesuit Mission and Values being most
  prevalent. However, 19 students indicated not knowing which learning outcome their enrichment session(s)
  related to.
- 201 of 209 respondents indicated attending at least one Messina-related event this semester. 133 of these students attended three or more events.
- Students were asked to reflect on the influence that Messina had in their life. 190 students responded to this
  question and their responses were coded based off of the Messina learning outcomes. Connections to the
  Loyola Community was the highest area of note (121) followed by Jesuit Mission and Values (52). Critical
  Understanding (26) and Integrated Learning (6) were areas that were not as frequently suggested in the
  responses.

## Other Observations:

Students that had the opportunity to experience aspects of Baltimore during their enrichment sessions
continue to highly value that experience, particularly those excursions that connected course topics in a reallife way.

- Students continue to report having positive relationships with their Evergreens, Faculty, and Mentors.
- Student responses suggest that they have less of an emphasis on/connection with their Messina theme. Conversely, students that have found meaning from their Messina themes are clearly able to articulate why their theme is relevant to their life.
- Conversations about diversity and multiculturalism during class and enrichment sessions have slightly increased and students have valued time spend engaging in discussions on these topics.
- Some responses indicated dissatisfaction for enrichment sessions that were solely a continuation on the
  course discussion. This is an area to further challenge working groups to have a balance of enrichment
  sessions that continue to examine course-related themes while also varying content related to the holistic
  development of students.
- Students were asked to describe how they would currently describe themselves as a student compared to when they first entered Loyola. 96% of students described positive changes over the course of the first year, including an increase of confidence, a greater sense of self-awareness, having broader perspectives and finding a sense of resiliency from when they first arrived.

# **Noted Observations:**


- Five of the students responded that the MLK Day speaker, Ta-Nehisi Coates, was most beneficial for them, particularly the discussions that they had during the enrichment session following the event. This event had an event guide available to working groups to utilize which appears to be a useful tool for working groups.
- Six of the "other" responses related to enrichment sessions that covered the topics of sexual misconduct and consent. This is of interest given the initiatives being done on campus towards the end of the fall 2014 semester and into the spring 2015 semester regarding addressing the topic of consent with students and the mandatory reporting procedures for university employees.

## **Responses:**

#### • Jesuit Mission and Values

- o "I think that Messina has mostly helped me to be more reflective. In the fall semester we journaled every enrichment hour and I really enjoyed that. I am the type of person who is always on to the next thing and I usually don't sit myself down and reflect, but Messina forced me to do that and I ended up really enjoying it."
- "I think I have become more aware of who I am as an individual and have been able to stay true to myself as a person. I learned through discernment what is really important to me and have been able to find people with values similar to my own."
- o "It has made me think more deeply about my values and beliefs. My perspective and worldview have changed significantly as I see the perspectives of others."

## Critical Understanding

- "As a member of Messina, I have really understood how important it is to really make a connection with your peers. I think that my two messina classes have been my two best classes this year because everyone is comfortable sharing and participating in class. I think that it has made me a better listener and more open to new things."
- "I think that Messina was a really good program. The best part was being able to have two classes with the same group of people. Not only that but both my classes were heavily discussion based so I felt so comfortable by the end of the second semester and confident speaking in front of my peers."
- "I really enjoyed my wonderful teachers [names redacted]. My [subject area redacted] course first semester really tied together my [subject area redacted] and [subject area redacted] courses, and my [subject area redacted] course second semester was excellent. I have met a lot of wonderful people through Messina too, and went on some pretty neat trips."

#### Connections to Loyola Community

- o "I feel that Messina has prepared me more as a part of campus. I better know my surroundings and am more aware of the people around me. I feel like Messina made the transition easier by helping to integrate me into the community rather than having me force my way in on my own."
- "I have learned that in order to have a very round and developed sense of college as a first year, first
  year students should really get involved in school activities other than academics as well as activities
  outside of classes."
- "I really enjoyed Messina because it not only helped me get to know a lot of people, but it helped me establish a good relationship with my professor's and advisors. It was so much easier going into second semester knowing that I would have a class with the people I had come to know so well."
- o "I went to more events then I normally would have. This was really helpful in getting me to go places and explore Loyola and Baltimore."

#### Integrated Learning

- "Messina has allowed me to integrate into the Loyola community, more fully than I believe I would have been able to without Messina. It has helped me to engage myself on campus as a leader, and an involved student here at Loyola. I can say that after my first year here, I have made countless friends, made a home for myself here at Loyola, found a job for next year, and have begun to look beyond my studies at the moment to larger ideas what I should take, what I want to do with my life, and who I really want to be. In this manner, Messina has influenced both me and my personality a great deal, and has made me into the person I am today. I can honestly say that I might not be where I am if it were not for Messina's influence on my first year."
- "It helped me learn more about Baltimore and the Loyola community but also become socially aware of the society we live and how my story can shape our society."

# Student Experience (Reflection Question)<sup>5</sup>

Question: As you wrap up your first year, how would you currently describe yourself as a student compared to when you first entered Loyola? (n=194)

Responses for this question were analyzed and common themes were pulled from responses. 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## Below is a sample of responses that relate to the top five themes:

#### Confident

- I cannot believe the year is over. I feel that I am way more confident—and I thought I was pretty confident in myself coming into Loyola. I feel older and wiser at making decisions for myself and for others. I am also now not afraid of awkward situations. Let's face it, the first few months of college are pretty awkward. As a student I am able to use all of this when engaging with people on group projects and speaking with professors.
- I am more secure in myself and my identity. I am more able to clearly articulate what I want to say and communicate. I am more confident in my ability to handle situations that I am placed into.

#### Self-aware

- I am more secure in myself and my identity. I am more able to clearly articulate what I want to say and communicate. I am more confident in my ability to handle situations that I am placed into.
- Much more secure and confident in who I am and what I like and the person I want to be going forward. Better understanding of my priorities and needs.
- More prepared, more experienced, less naive, and less apprehensive/stressed about my future plans.

#### **Broader perspectives**

- I have grown so much since coming to Loyola in August. I feel more aware of my self, of others, and of several social issues. Overall, I love myself more now than I did when I first came to campus.
- I would say that I am more of a rounded and "worldly" person. Volunteering around Baltimore and visiting Baltimore in different places that I would not normally visit if I was just passing through has made me understand more about the world as a whole. It has helped me learn more about myself as a college student and where I want to be and what I want to do with my life.
- My perspectives of life, time, relationships, intellectual conversation and academic excitement have developed immensely. I have encountered so many new types of people and learned so many new things that I was not exposed to in high school.

## Resiliency

- I now see myself as a student who consistently tries even if I don't always succeed and is able to pick themselves back up as opposed to a student who just succeeded at everything and worked a lot but never as hard as I do now.
- Coming to Loyola I was a bit timid in becoming involved with the community. Contrary to the typical shyness or the out-of-comfort zone one might face; I was hesitant to make my way here solely because of the fact Loyola was not my dream school. I spent the entire first semester wishing I was attending another (Jesuit) institution. However, amidst these thoughts and emotions, I found an authentic care at this small school, that I was not to sure would exist elsewhere. What Messina, along with several administrators, mentors, and friends unequivocally showed me was a way to invest myself. Whether things were perfect or not, the happiness and engagement found in this community itself drove me to appreciate the small things. Messina highlights many opportunities to think outside the box. When I see the passion in my professors face, or the great lengths of care faculty members take; I could not help but to begin investing myself along side them. Most importantly, my time as a staff member in the one program I became involved with here on campus has truly created a full circle experience I am now seeing. In a way, I am glad I struggled at first, because I would not be able to appreciate this wonderful school with incredible programs so much more. Our theme was the Visionary, and I certainly see myself going places within this University now. Thanks to everyone that puts it all together. And for the budget.

#### Openness

- I am more open to new things and I have learned to appreciate the time I have with my family, since I come from far away.
- I am more open, to those around me and cam now build bridges where there were no opportunities before.
- I feel as if I'm more willing to try new things, and more aware of the campus life, as well as what resources I have at my disposal.

# **Good Relationships**

- When I first entered Loyola I was extremely nervous because I was the only person from my school and town
  who was going here. I was excited to start fresh, but it was scary to not know anyone at all. However I made
  friends so quickly at Loyola and that helped me to really open up. I am much more outgoing now. Also, the
  tough academic curriculum strengthened my work ethic.
- I would say I'm more independent, just as college makes anybody. I also feel like I belong to a great group of students and an Evergreen from my Messina that I hope to all stay in contact with. I also feel genuinely supported by my Spring semester Messina professor and that I can go to my Messina Mentor with anything I need or want to talk about. This is important to me because being supported and supportive are two of the things that I need most. Also, I've surprised myself with how well my public high school has academically and emotionally prepared me for this university.

#### **Other Comments**

83 responses were offered by students. The following are some noted observations from the comments:

- Some students wanted more class trips and felt like other classes has a larger budget because they did more class trips
- Some students wanted fewer class trips or optional trips
- Praise for Messina experience
- Enrichment sessions should be a balance of class extensions and other topics, not all enrichment sessions should be class continuation
- Too many enrichment sessions in the spring
- Appreciation of the relationships formed within Messina
