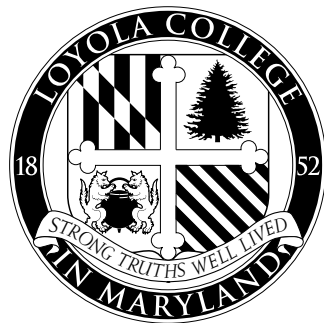

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# General Information

## ESCORT SERVICE

The Student Escort/Monitor Program, sponsored by the Department of Public Safety, provides the Loyola Community with safe, reliable escorts to locations on and around the Baltimore Campus. Hours:

Sunday – Wednesday 6 p.m. – 2 a.m.  
Thursday – Saturday 6 p.m. – 3 a.m.

At all other times, campus police are available to provide an escort as requested. Student Escort/Monitors are trained and supervised by campus police. They are equipped with campus police walkie-talkie radios, flashlights, and identification cards which must be displayed at all times. Both student escort/monitors and campus police escorts are arranged by calling 410-617-5566.

## ID CARDS

All students are required to have an activated ID card issued by Student Administrative Services (Maryland Hall 140). There is a \$15 fee for replacement ID cards.

## UPDATING ADDRESS INFORMATION

Students living off-campus must report a change in their local, off-campus address (including verification of parental/permanent address) and telephone number in writing to the Records Office no later than the first day of classes. Cell phone numbers are required. ## DIRECTORY INFORMATION

Loyola College considers the following information to be directory information which can be released without the written consent of the student: name; photo; home, dorm, local, and e-mail address; home, dorm, local phone number; voice mailbox; class year; enrollment status; participation in officially recognized activities and sports; and weight and height of members of athletic teams. # Registration Information

## WEB REGISTRATION — NEW

Continuing undergraduate students may use WebAdvisor to register for summer courses. Students must know their User ID and Password (same as Groupwise and Blackboard) to access WebAdvisor. If you do not know your User ID and Password or you need to have your Password reset, contact the Technology Service Center at 410-617-5555.

### When can I use WebAdvisor?

WebAdvisor will **open March 10, 2008** at 9 a.m. and **close May 9, 2008** at 5 p.m.

### Who is eligible to register for the summer using WebAdvisor?

Only continuing undergraduate students, including those students studying abroad, are eligible to use WebAdvisor for summer registration.

Newly admitted, readmitted, first-time transfer, visiting, or special students **must** register in person. Contact the Academic Advising and Support Center (AASC) for an appointment, 410-617-5050.

### How do I prepare for Summer Web registration?

1. Access the course schedule by visiting, [www.catalogue.loyola.edu/records/undergraduate](http://www.catalogue.loyola.edu/records/undergraduate) or use the printed course schedule booklet distributed to student mailboxes by **February 29, 2008**.
2. Consult with AASC in-person, by phone, or e-mail (study abroad students). They will advise you on the courses needed to complete your degree requirements and check for completion of, or current registration for, necessary prerequisites.
3. Provide AASC with evidence of permission for all courses requiring permission of the instructor.
4. After advising you about your course eligibility, AASC will enter an electronic code giving you access to register using WebAdvisor.

### How do I pay for courses when using WebAdvisor?

Students using WebAdvisor will be billed for summer registration charges and fees. The tuition discount will be applied **after** WebAdvisor registration closes on **May 9, 2008**. Students who wish to pay prior to the billing date must contact Student Administrative Services (410-617-5047) in order to obtain the correct tuition amount.

## MAIL-IN REGISTRATION

Registration materials are mailed to part-time students. Full-time students will receive schedule booklet and registration materials in their campus mailboxes by **February 29, 2008**.

Mail-in registrations with payment in full will be accepted through **May 16, 2008** for the first summer session and through **July 8, 2008** for the second summer session. After those dates, registrations, which must be signed by a counselor from the Academic Advising and Support Center (MH 043), will only be accepted in person in the Records Office. Third party billing (payment by employer or agency) is acceptable in place of payment if the registration is accompanied by the proper forms which have been approved by the third party. If registration, with tuition and fees, has not been submitted by 4:30 p.m., **May 16, 2008** for the first summer session or 7:30 p.m., **July 8, 2008** for the second summer session, an additional non-refundable late payment fee of \$25 will be charged.

Submission of registration by a student incurs the obligation to pay all tuition and fees. Withdrawal from a course, even prior to the first class, must be submitted on a Change of Registration Form which has been completed by the student and approved by an administrator from the Academic Advising and Support Center (MH 043); non-payment of tuition or mere non-attendance at class or permission from an instructor to withdraw from a course does not constitute official withdrawal from the course. *Unless approval is received from the Academic Advising and Support Center, a grade of F will be entered on the student's permanent record.* In case of inability to return to campus, please write or telephone the Academic Advising and Support Center, 410-617-5050.

### Please Note:

- Academic advising is important and should not be left until the end of the registration period.
- **Register early**; courses will fill and close.
- **Important:** All Registration Request Forms **must** include the **section number** after the course key; ex., CH101.01 General Chemistry I

Tuition, housing, registration and other fees may be paid with Visa, MasterCard, Discover, or American Express. Please enter credit card number and expiration date on the Registration Request Form if you choose this option. For all questions regarding financial aid, please inquire at the Financial Aid Office (HU 207A) or call 410-617-2576.

In many instances, income tax deductions are allowed for tuition and other educational expenses. Students are referred to the Federal ruling on income tax deductions for teachers and other professional people seeking to maintain or improve skills required in their employment.

### STUDY ABROAD STUDENTS

Study abroad students who wish to take summer courses at Loyola College or another institution must follow the same course approval process as students studying on the Baltimore Campus; however, all communication is done via e-mail.

Study abroad students will receive a PDF of the summer course schedule via e-mail; however, this file will **not** contain the yellow registration form required for mail-in registration. To obtain a printed summer schedule booklet with a yellow registration form, contact the Records Office, 410-617-2263. The booklet will be mailed to your permanent home address.

### Mail-In Registration Procedures

1. **Student Permission:** E-mail your parent/guardian giving them your permission to complete the yellow registration form on your behalf.
2. **Registration/Payment:** The Registration Form signed by the parent/guardian, along with a printed copy of the student's e-mail permission, may be either mailed or hand-delivered to the Records Office. Payment is required at the time of registration. Visa, MasterCard,

Discover, American Express, and personal checks are accepted. Mailed registrations must include credit card information or a check payable to Loyola College.

The Academic Advising and Support Center (AASC) will sign the Registration Form, and the registration will be processed. The courses will then appear on WebAdvisor, My Class Schedule. If there are any registration problems, AASC will contact the student via e-mail.

### VISITING AND SPECIAL STUDENTS

Visiting students (those matriculating and in good standing at another institution) must submit an application and an authorization letter from their home institution for the courses they wish to take at Loyola. Special students (those who have earned a four-year college degree and are taking courses but not matriculating for a degree) must complete an Application for Admission Form and submit official transcripts to the Admissions Office for previously completed undergraduate and graduate courses. New students must register in person at the Academic Advising and Support Center (MH 043) rather than by mail.

### APPLICATION FOR GRADUATION

Students expecting to graduate **September 30, 2008** must file an Application for Graduation with the Records Office and pay the fee of **\$125** by **May 29, 2008**.

### READMISSION

Students who have not registered for courses for at least one of the three previous semesters must reapply.

## Additional Information

### TUITION DEPOSIT

Returning commuter and resident students must submit the Tuition Deposit to hold their place in classes. The deposit is applied toward the fall tuition charges. The Fall 2008 deposit is due in Student Administrative Services by 4:30 p.m., **February 15, 2008**.

The deposit is partially refundable if the student notifies the College in writing by **July 1** of the official withdrawal from the College for the upcoming fall semester. This letter should be directed to the Records Office. **No refund** will be granted if the student notifies the College of the intent to withdraw after this date.

### WITHDRAWAL/REFUND POLICY

Requests to withdraw from a course must be submitted in writing on the Change of Registration Form. Requests are considered official once they are approved by an administrator from the Academic Advising and Support Center and received in the Records Office. Phone requests will not be accepted. Lack of course attendance or notification to the instructor **does not** constitute an official withdrawal. A student who fails to obtain official permission to withdraw will be assigned a grade of *F* (failure). The last day for withdrawal with a grade of *W* in the first summer session is **7:30 p.m., June 23, 2008** and **7:30 p.m., July 31, 2008** for the second summer session.

In case of a necessary withdrawal, which must have the official approval from the Academic Advising and Support Center, **refunds to students will be made according to the following schedule: 60 percent during the first week of class; 20 percent during the second week of class.**

### AUDIT POLICY

Students wishing to audit a course may do so on a space-available basis if approval is granted prior to the beginning of the semester by the academic advisor and the faculty member involved. Students who register to audit a course may not change their registration and take the course for credit after **June 2, 2008** for the first summer session or **July 15, 2008** for the second summer session, nor may students who register to take a course for credit change to audit after **June 2, 2008** for the first summer session or **July 15, 2008** for the second summer session.

Listener status denotes that the student is auditing the course. To receive a grade of *L* on the transcript, the student must satisfy the attendance and other course requirements set by the instructor for an official audit. Students not meeting the requirements set for an audit will receive a final grade of *AW*.

### WEB INFORMATION

Individual student schedules are available on the Web ([www.loyola.edu/webadvisor](http://www.loyola.edu/webadvisor)). Continuing students should allow approximately one week for processing (data entry and advisor approval) of mail-in registrations before attempting access and 24 hours for advisor-approved registrations. New students must have their User ID and Password before attempting access; this information is mailed once the registration is processed.

Classroom assignments on the Baltimore Campus are finalized approximately two weeks prior to the start of the semester. Check your schedule on the Web just prior to the start of classes for this updated information. ### INDEPENDENT OR PRIVATE STUDIES AND INTERNSHIPS

Internships and independent or private studies are courses which require Specialized Study Forms to accompany the registration. Forms are available in the Academic Advising and Support Center and the Records Office. As with all other courses, **the registration process must be completed by the end of the late registration period each semester**. This means that much of the preparation for these courses must be completed well before the semester begins, since meetings with the site supervisor (for internships), the faculty member, and the department chair are all necessary in the completion of the Specialized Study Form.

In the case of internships, students must adhere to the following guidelines: 1) have junior or senior standing; 2) meet the prerequisites set by the department; 3) sign waiver forms; and 4) commit 150 hours per semester (10 hours/week) to the unpaid position. In the Communication and Marketing Departments, interns meet once a week in a class with the faculty member acting as internship monitor. In other internships, regular meetings between the student and the faculty monitor will take place throughout the semester. There will also be regular contact between the faculty monitor and the site supervisor.

An independent or private study course covers a subject in depth which is not available in the roster of courses. The course requires much more independent effort on the part of the student than is required in a classroom course. Students should not seek to undertake an independent or private study course unless they have the interest, motivation, discipline, and time to devote to such a demanding enterprise. During the term, regular meetings with the faculty supervisor are necessary to ensure that the student is on track for a timely completion of the project.

### MATHEMATICS AND LANGUAGE PLACEMENT

All new students who have not taken high-school calculus and whose SAT master score is below 560 must take a mathematics placement test. Language placement for new students will be based on the language placement test required of all students. To make arrangements for either test, contact the Academic Advising and Support Center, 410-617-5050.

### REPEAT/REPLACEMENT COURSE(S)

For a student planning to repeat a course or to replace one course for another, the following procedure must be followed:

1. A Repeat/Replacement Form must be completed. (*Available on Web/in Records Office*)
2. The student's advisor must sign the form.
3. The form must be submitted with the Registration Request Form.
4. The "R" under the course status portion on the Registration Request Form must be circled.

All grades for a repeated course will be **included** with the original grade in the computation of the cumulative QPA. **Both** the original grade and the new grade appear on the transcript. When a major is changed, major courses in the original major may be replaced with major courses in the new major. The grade for the replacement courses will **replace** the original grade in the computation of the cumulative QPA; however, **both** the original grade and the replacement grade appear on the transcript.
