Winning a highly competitive and prestigious national fellowship or scholarship confers lifelong advantages.

The Loyola College National Fellowships Program helps outstanding Loyola students obtain national fellowship and scholarship opportunities.

The National Fellowships Committee is comprised of faculty and administrative staff. The Committee identifies and recruits qualified candidates, encourages them to apply for funding opportunities, and guides them through the application process.

Each national fellowship/scholarship is assigned a Campus Coordinator. The Campus Coordinator for a given fellowship or scholarship can provide application materials and offers individual guidance to applicants.

Overview

General Information

Nationally competitive fellowships and scholarships are available for graduate study both in the United States and in other countries. These awards confer unparalleled prestige and provide recipients with priceless educational and cultural experiences.

The Loyola National Fellowships Committee has developed a process for preparation that, since 1983, has won students over seventy major awards. Though individual competitions vary in financial value, some range up to several hundred thousand dollars.

Members of the Loyola National Fellowships Committee can provide insight into available fellowships and scholarships. Faculty advisers are excellent resources for students who want to learn about the most appropriate graduate programs in one's major.

The application process alone can expand one's vision regarding aspirations for the future, as well as suggest academic and extracurricular options that could enhance the possibilities for success in attaining one's goals.

Briefly, the purpose of these applications is to convince someone that you have the necessary ability, dedication, education, and vision to be worth an investment in your future. The process of convincing a prospective donor that you are indeed worth that investment can take much thought and effort.

Planning should begin very early in a student's college career. Preparation of the actual applications should begin months in advance of submission. The more time allowed for compiling and refining the application, the greater your chances for success.

Submission Materials

While requirements vary from competition to competition, most fellowships ask students to submit the following items:

- college transcript
- résumé
- recommendation letters
- essays regarding life experiences and professional goals
- an evaluation submitted by the National Fellowships Committee

Transcripts: Many students do not apply simply because they wrongly believe that national fellowships are only awarded to 4.0 students. For many scholarships, a 3.5 GPA places a student in a competitive position. Students with lesser GPA's, but who have demonstrated marked improvement throughout their college careers, have been known to win large awards.

Résumé: Reviewers often favor students whose extracurricular activities show progressive leadership in the area of interest to a particular fellowship.

Recommendation letters: Cultivating and interacting sufficiently with faculty so that they can submit strong supporting documents can take a year or more.

Essays: Strong, convincing essays can be key determinants. More than any other part of the application, essays reveal a student's critical thinking ability. Mastery of reflective, reporting, explanatory, and persuasive writing techniques often distinguishes winning from noncompetitive essays.

National Fellowships Committee Evaluation: The evaluation provides additional commentary on a student's viability from the perspective of those experienced in working with nominees and awardees.

The Application Process

Applications for most awards go through a two-step process. Since, many fellowships limit the number of applicants a college or university may sponsor, the Loyola National Fellowships Committee screens submissions and selects the most viable candidates for national competitions.

Once applications are submitted to the Loyola National Fellowships Program office, Committee members study these written applications and then interview those applicants whose written materials indicate that they could be competitive beyond Loyola.

Those applicants who are selected by the Committee become candidates for the national competition. The Committee works with these candidates to refine applications prior to final submission to the funding agency or foundation. The Committee also provides mock interviews as practice sessions for candidates who are invited to participate in that aspect of national competitions.

It should be noted that Loyola often sets institutional deadlines for receipt of application materials. This is done to provide ample time for the selection of candidates and to allow time for those candidates to refine applications prior to submission to the external organizations which sponsor fellowships and scholarships.

FELLOWSHIPS AND SCHOLARSHIPS

I. David Boren Scholarship / NSEP

The Boren Scholarship was established in 1991 and is regulated by the National Security Education Program. The scholarship provides funding for undergraduate or graduate study in a number of targeted countries and fields.

Students awarded Boren Scholarships must fulfill a service agreement upon graduation which requires a period of brief employment at a governmental agency or an office involved in national security affairs.

Students awarded Boren Scholarships will receive a maximum of \$10,000 per semester or \$20,000 per academic year, depending on program costs and student need. Boren Scholars may choose to study abroad for a 6-week summer session, a semester, or a full year.

General Eligibility Requirements:

- a. Currently enrolled in undergraduate study.
- b. Desire to study a foreign language in addition to any major-related study.
- c. Interested in studying critical languages or fields related to security interest as well as to those interested in study in selected areas.

Deadline for receipt of completed applications is early February.

II. Gates Cambridge Scholarships

Established in 2000 by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, the Gates Cambridge Scholarships provide students with the opportunity to study at the University of Cambridge. Scholarships may be awarded to students who have already been accepted by the University of Cambridge or who demonstrate academic abilities consistent with acceptance requirements.

Gates Cambridge Scholarships provide full financial compensation of tuition expenses and related fees. Additionally, Gates Cambridge scholars are provided with a supportive allowance and limited funding of travel expenses.

Requirements:

A candidate for a Gates Cambridge Scholarship must:

- a. Possess a bachelor's degree from an accredited institution, and
- b. Be accepted by the University of Cambridge following independent application or must demonstrate academic indices (undergraduate GPA and GRE scores) congruent with the University's acceptance standards.
- c. Generally, be under the age of 30
- d. Apply for full-time study in one of the following courses of study:
 - Research leading to the PhD degree
 - One-year post-graduate courses (e.g. MPhil, LLM, Diploma etc.)
 - Second Bachelor degree as an Affiliated Student
 - MBBChir Clinical Studies

Unsuccessful applicants are automatically considered for other awards for which they are eligible from one or other of the Cambridge Trusts.

Deadline for the receipt of applications is the middle of October.

III. Jack Kent Cooke Scholarships

The Jack Kent Cooke Scholarship Foundation was established in 1997. Approximately 66 graduate scholarships are awarded each year throughout the United States.

There are no limitations on the field of study.

Students awarded the Cooke Scholarship will receive funding for tuition, school costs, room and board, and other relevant expenses not covered by other scholarships. The maximum allotment equals \$50,000 per year for up to six years.

Eligibility Requirements:

- a. Currently enrolled in their senior year of undergraduate study or those who have graduated within 5 years.
- b. Must be accepted into a full-time graduate program by an accredited university, or will have received acceptance by the application deadline of April 30.
- c. Required to have maintained a minimum cumulative GPA of 3.5 during their undergraduate studies.
- d. Financial need.

Applicants do not apply directly to the Cooke Foundation, but are sponsored by Loyola. Loyola deadline for receipt of applications from interested students is the end of January.

Jack Kent Cooke Foundation deadline for receipt of applications is the end of April.

IV. Fulbright Grants for Graduate Study and Research Abroad

Fulbright Student Program offers over 1,200 post-baccalaureate fellowships each year for study, research, or teaching assistantship experience in more than 140 countries. Grants are awarded in all fields of study.

Candidates can design their own programs, including any combination formal coursework, library or field research, independent projects, professional training in the arts, and/or teaching assistantships in English.

The Fulbright U.S. Student Program is administered by the Institute of International Education (IIE). Please see www.fulbrightonline.org for more information.

- Awards grants to U.S. citizens in all fields of study
- Operates in more than 140 countries worldwide
- Awards more than 1,200 grants to U.S. students to study overseas
- Offers one academic year of study, research, or teaching assistantship experience
- Projects may include university course work, independent library or field research, or professional training in the arts.

THE U.S. STUDENT PROGRAM IS DESIGNED FOR:

Recent BA/BS graduates, master's, and doctoral candidates

- Provide opportunities for personal development and international experience
- Provide invaluable opportunities to meet, work, and live with people of the host country, sharing daily experiences
- Promote cross-cultural interaction and mutual understanding through engagement in the community on a one-to-one basis in an atmosphere of openness, academic integrity, and intellectual freedom
- Foster appreciation of other's viewpoints and beliefs, the way they do things, and the way they think, through direct interaction with them on an individual basis in the classroom, field, home, and in daily tasks

The Fulbright Grant for Graduate Study and Research Abroad gives students the opportunity to live and study in a foreign country for one academic year. Grants are available for most European countries and many African, Asian, and Latin American nations.

The purpose of the grants is to increase mutual understanding between the people of the United States and other countries through the exchange of persons, knowledge, and skills.

Fulbright awards generally cover tuition, maintenance, and travel between home and the host country. The amount may vary according to the cost of living in the host country.

Eligibility Requirements

- a. Must be a United States citizen.
- b. Must hold a B.A. degree or its equivalent before the beginning date of the grant.
- c. Must have received the majority of high school and undergraduate college education at educational institutions in the United States. Participation in a year abroad program under the auspices of a college or university in the U.S. is considered study at the U.S. institution.
- d. Must have proficiency in the written and spoken language of the host country in order to communicate with the people and to carry out the proposed study.
- e. Must be in good health.

Preference is generally given to those who have not lived abroad for an extended period of time, although junior year abroad or a similar program as part of one's college program is not an impediment to receiving a Fulbright Grant.

V. Goldwater Scholarships for Mathematical and Physical Sciences and Engineering

The Barry M. Goldwater Scholarship and Excellence in Education Program, was established by Congress to pay tribute to the leadership, courage, and educational vision of Senator Goldwater, while alleviating a critical current and future shortage of mathematicians and scientists.

This endowed program fosters and encourages excellence in mathematical and natural sciences and engineering through awarding approximately 330 scholarships annually across the United States.

Each college and university is allowed up to four nominees, and conducts its own local competition to select these nominees.

Eligibility Requirements:

A candidate for a Goldwater Scholarship:

- a. Be a matriculated sophomore or junior preparing for a research career in mathematical and natural sciences and engineering.
- b. Be in the upper quartile of her or his class. Most scholars selected have had a grade point average of at least 3.8
- c. Be a United States citizen, a resident alien, with intent to obtain a U.S. citizenship or a United States national.

VI. James Madison Fellowships

The James Madison Memorial Fellowship Foundation was established by an act of Congress in 1986. The foundation provides funding for students seeking their Master's degree in history, political science, or education. Fellowships are granted to at least one student from each state with additional awards contingent upon remaining scholarship funds.

Students awarded Madison Fellowships will be provided with funding for tuition, room and board, books, and related fees equaling a maximum of \$24,000 over the full course of graduate study. Madison Fellowships are granted for a maximum of 2 years of full-time study or 5 years of part-time study.

Eligibility Requirements:

A candidate for a James Madison Fellowship:

- a. Awarded to college seniors or to recent graduates who desire to pursue a Master's degree in an approved subject area related to history, political science, or education.
- b. Must be U.S. citizens and are required to teach American history, American government, or social studies in grades 7-12 for one full year following the completion of their graduate degree.
- c. Junior fellowships may be awarded to students who will be entering into full-time graduate study, while senior fellowships are intended for teachers who plan on part-time graduate study.

VII. Marshall Scholarships for Study in the United Kingdom

The Marshall Scholarship program was established in 1953 by the United Kingdom Government as an expression of British gratitude for the European Recovery Program instituted by General George C. Marshall in 1947, under which generous economic assistance was provided by the United States to help the recovery of Britain and other European countries after World War II.

The purpose of the program is to enable citizens of the United States, both men and women, who are graduates of U.S. colleges and universities to study for a degree of a university in the United Kingdom for a period of at least two academic years. Up to thirty Marshall Scholarships are offered each year; each includes tuition, fees, and a stipend to cover books, travel, and living expenses.

Eligibility Requirements:

A candidate for a Marshall Scholarship:

- a. Must be a citizen of the United States.
- b. Must combine high academic ability and achievement (generally a cumulative GPA of 3.7 or above) with the capacity to play an active part in the life of the United Kingdom.
- c. Must not have reached the twenty-fifth birthday by October 1 of the year of application.
- d. Must present a proposal for study at any university in the United Kingdom and show that the applicant's course preparation in the U.S. qualifies the applicant to pursue the proposed study in the United Kingdom.
- e. Must have obtained an undergraduate degree in the U.S. by the time of taking up residence at a British university.

Since applicants for a Marshall Scholarship must submit more than one choice of a British university at which to pursue a program of studies, it is extremely important to know which universities offer programs in which the applicant is interested.

VIII. George Mitchell Scholarships

The Mitchell Scholarship was created by the US-Ireland Alliance in 2000 to honor former United States Senator George Mitchell's role in the Northern Ireland peace negotiations of the 1990's. The Alliance annually awards 12 Mitchell scholarships to American students interested in pursuing graduate study in Ireland.

Each Mitchell Scholarship provides funding for tuition, housing, travel, and certain living expenses during 1 year of study at an institution of higher learning in Ireland.

Eligibility Requirements:

A candidate for a George Mitchell Scholarship:

- a. Must be an American citizen between the ages of 18 and 30 who will have obtained their Bachelor's degree before beginning scholarship funded study.
- b. Competition is open to all majors.

IX. National Science Foundation Graduate Fellowships

As one means of promoting the progress of science in the United States, the National Science Foundation (NSF) awards Graduate Fellowships, varying in number according to funds allotted each year, to individuals who have demonstrated ability and special aptitude for advanced training in the sciences.

NSF Graduate Fellowships are awarded for study or work leading to master's or doctoral degrees in the mathematical, physical, biological, engineering, and social sciences and the history and philosophy of science. Awards are not made in clinical, education, or business fields, in history or social work, for work leading to medical, dental, law, or public health degrees, or for study in joint science-professional degree programs. Applications are encouraged from minorities, women, physically handicapped, and members of other groups under represented in science and engineering.

Eligibility Requirements:

A candidate for a National Science Foundation Fellowship:

- a. Must be a citizen or a national of the United States at the time of application.
- b. Must be a college senior or first-year graduate student who, at the time of application, has not completed more than 20 semester/30 quarter hours, or equivalent, of study in any of the science and engineering fields listed as acceptable, following completion of a first baccalaureate degree, or its equivalent.
- c. Must take the Graduate Record Aptitude (Quantitative, Verbal, and Analytical) Examination, and also the GRE Advanced Test in a field most closely related to the chosen area of graduate study. NSF will pay GRE test fees for the December GRE in the year of application, providing that the NSF application is the primary purpose.

X. Rhodes Scholarships

Thirty-two Rhodes Scholars are chosen from the United States each year, four in each of eight districts. The Scholarships are tenable only at Oxford University, usually for two years, although sometimes extended to three years, and they include tuition and fees at Oxford in addition to a stipend for living expenses and one round trip between the Scholar's home and Oxford.

Scholars possessing a bachelor's degree from an American university may obtain from one of the 31 Honour Schools an Oxford B.A. which, following medieval precedent, may "supplicate for the Degree of Master of Arts in or after the twenty-first term" from the Scholar's matriculation at Oxford. Several of the Honour Schools offer interdisciplinary programs, and all are based on the tutorial system of education. Details about the various programs are found in each year's "Prospectus."

Eligibility Requirements:

A candidate for a Rhodes Scholarship:

- a. Must be a citizen of the United States with at least five years of residence in the U.S.
- b. Must be unmarried, at least for the first year of the residency at Oxford.
- c. Must be between the ages of 18 and 24, inclusive, on October 1 of the year of application.
- d. Must have achieved academic standing sufficiently advanced to assure completion of a bachelor's degree before October of the year following application.
- e. Must give substantial evidence of a combination of qualities that Cecil Rhodes desired his Scholars to possess: (1) literary and scholastic attainments; (2) physical vigor; (3) truth, courage, devotion to duty, sympathy for and protection of the weak, kindness, unselfishness and fellowship; (4) moral force of character and instincts to lead, and to take an interest in one's contemporaries.

Unwritten Rules of Eligibility:

- a. If you don't have at least a 3.5 average, your application will have to show exceptional strength in other ways.
- b. Great emphasis is placed on the leadership qualification, especially in the district in which Maryland is located.
- c. Applicants most definitely need not be varsity athletes. Selection committees are more concerned about the qualities of fellowship, courage, fair play, and vigor than about a varsity monogram.

XI. Rotary Foundation Scholarships

The Rotary Foundation of Rotary International offers graduate scholarships for study abroad. Applications are taken on what the Rotary calls a “rolling application process”, but all applications to be considered in any calendar year’s competition must be submitted by late summer or very early fall, depending on the local sponsoring Rotary Club. Although written applications may be submitted directly through the Rotary Club of Baltimore, it is extremely advisable (and much more conducive to success) to submit your application through your local club. Information on existing local clubs may be obtained from the Loyola faculty coordinator for Rotary Scholarships, after which you should contact a member of the local club to determine its procedure for submitting candidates from that club.

A Rotary award includes full tuition, room, board, transportation, limited intra-country travel funds, and miscellaneous expenses for one academic year of study in any of the 150 countries in which there are Rotary Clubs. Approximately 140 scholarships are awarded each year.

Eligibility Requirements:

A candidate for a Rotary Graduate Scholarship:

- a. Must be between the ages of 18 through 28 inclusive as of time of application unless during the age bracket period the student was in military service of the student’s country, in which case the upper age limit may be waived by the Trustees.
- b. Must hold a bachelor’s degree or the equivalent prior to the commencement of the scholarship year. An applicant who does not hold a bachelor’s degree is required to submit a statement from a university official certifying that the student has an equivalent standing and is eligible for graduate work.
- c. May be married.

Men and women are eligible to apply for Rotary Scholarships. Applicants should keep in mind that the purpose of the award is largely to serve as an effective bridge of friendship and understanding between peoples in the home and host countries. It is very important that the Rotary Scholar have a friendly, outgoing personality, a sympathetic interest in the attitudes and way of life of the people of a different culture, and the ability to communicate ideas readily and effectively. Applicants should have a good understanding of the customs and history of the country where they wish to study, and should be proficient, at the time of application, in the language of each proposed study country and study institution. Likewise, applicants must understand the history, culture and current affairs in their home country. Finally, they must be physically and mentally able to carry on a rigorous year of study and travel in another country.

Preference is given to applicants who wish to study in a country whose language is different from their own. Insufficient language background may be supplemented sometimes at the expense of Rotary International.

XII. Paul and Daisy Soros Fellowships

Bearing the name of its benefactors, the Soros Fellowship was established in 1998 and has provided funding to over 110 students. Foreign born students or students whose parents have become naturalized citizens are eligible for scholarship consideration. Each fellowship provides funding for tuition and additional expenses applicable to graduate study within the United States.

Students awarded Soros Fellowships will be provided with a maintenance grant of \$20,000 in addition to tuition grant equaling one half of tuition costs. Fellowship funding may be extended for a maximum of two years.

Eligibility Requirements:

A candidate for a Soros Fellowship:

- a. Must either currently hold a Green Card as a resident alien, have become a naturalized citizen of the United States, or be the child of parents who have both become naturalized citizens.
- b. Obtained their Bachelor's degree or who are enrolled in their final year of undergraduate study.
- c. Students already engaged in graduate study are also encouraged to apply.

XIII. Harry S. Truman Scholarships for Public Service Careers

The Harry S. Truman Scholarship Foundation, established by Congress as the official Federal memorial to honor the thirty-third President of the United States, is a permanent education scholarship program designed to prepare for careers in public service. Truman Scholarships are awarded on the basis of merit to students who are college juniors and who have outstanding potential for leadership in public service. Each college and university is allowed a limited number of nominees each year, and conducts its own competition to decide its nominee(s).

Eligibility Requirements:

To be considered for nomination from Loyola, a student must:

- a. Be a citizen or a national of the United States.
- b. Be a first-semester junior pursuing a bachelor' degree on a full-time basis.
- c. Have an average of at least B and be in the upper quartile of his or her class.
- d. Have selected a major that will permit admission to a graduate program leading to a career in public service.
- e. Have a record that demonstrates interest in public service.

XIV. Morris K. Udall Scholarships for Environmental Science

The Morris K. Udall Scholarship and Excellence in National Environmental Policy Foundation, authorized by Congress in 1992, honors Congressman Udall and his legacy of public service, the lasting impact he has had on this nation's environment, public lands, and natural resources, and the love of these resources he has instilled in this nation's youth. He has also championed the rights of Native Americans and Alaska Natives and used his leadership in Congress to strengthen tribal self-government. Udall Scholarships will be awarded to: 1) Students who have outstanding potential and intend to pursue careers in environmental public policy, environmental law, environmental science or related fields; and 2) Native American and Alaska Native students who have outstanding potential and intend to pursue careers in health care or tribal public policy.

Eligibility Requirements:

A candidate for a Udall Scholarship:

- a. Be a sophomore or junior at the time of nomination.

- b. Have a college grade-point average of at least a B (or the equivalent).
- c. Be a United States citizen, a permanent resident alien, or a United States national.
