Self-Guided Tour

Please feel free to walk around campus and explore on your own. The following are some facts about each of the buildings. Please use the attached map to locate each of the buildings.

Humanities Building (20)

- Oldest, most distinct building on campus, purchased from the Garrett family
- Lots of nooks and crannies for studying, not to mention rocking chairs for relaxing on the porch!
- First building located on the Evergreen campus (1922)
- Houses the Humanities (Departments of Classics, English, History, Philosophy, Theology and Writing) the Undergraduate Admission Office and the Office of Financial Aid
- The Center for Community Service and Justice (CCSJ) has a significant role on our campus. This office organizes a community service fair each fall, with representatives advertising the many service opportunities in which students can participate on a daily, weekly or monthly basis
- More than half of Loyola students are involved in community service
- The Office of International Programs located here. Over 65% of Loyola juniors study abroad; this office is where students learn about, apply for and plan for their study abroad experience(s).
- President's Office overlooks the Academic Ouad

Academic Ouad

- Center of campus
- All classrooms are in buildings surrounding the quad, with the exception of Speech Language Pathology and Audiology classrooms (located in Newman Towers)
- Popular spot for students to gather, study, play Frisbee, and surf the internet (entire campus is wireless!)
- Professors may hold class outside on fair weather days
- School-wide festival (Loyolapalooza) held on the quad each April

Jenkins Hall (19)

- Originally the campus library
- The Study is on top floor
 - Ouiet area for students to study
 - o Computer stations, comfortable couches and study rooms available
 - Home of the Tutoring Center (free for students)
- Writing Center in basement
 - Peer writing help for all academic areas by English and Writing upperclassmen (also free for students)

Beatty Hall (17)

- School of Education housed here, including classrooms and faculty offices
- Psychology, Sociology and Political Science also housed here

Donnelly Science Center/Knott Hall (14/13)

- Largest academic complex on campus
- Houses Biology, Chemistry, Computer Science, Engineering Science, and Physics departments; faculty offices, labs and classrooms
- Student Technology Services (Knott Hall)
- High-tech, state-of-the-art lab facilities
- Several computer labs and printer stations, accessible to students 24/7 via swipe card

Alumni Chapel (15)

- Daily liturgies offered
- Campus-wide celebrations and alumni weddings held here
- Loyola is a Catholic institution, but all denominations are welcome; a variety of services are held
- Students not required to attend mass, but multiple mass times/locations available for interested students

Cohn Hall (16)

- Houses the Campus Ministry office
- Each class may participate in two class retreats annually
- "Kairos to College" retreats held annually
- Lovola's retreat center located in Western Maryland

Sellinger School of Business & Management (21)

- High-tech classrooms, computers and TV areas resembling the stock exchange
- Business faculty offices
- Named after former Loyola President, and designed by same architect of Bill Gates' home
- Includes study areas, computer labs and a café a-la-cart

Maryland Hall (22)

- Student Administrative Services, Records Office, Academic Advising and Support Center, Modern Languages and Literature Department
- Language Learning Center on 4th floor offers software and tutoring programs to help students with their foreign language courses

DeChiaro College Center (23)

- The Career Center (located on ground floor) assists students with major selection and career exploration
 - o Hosts workshops for resume building and interviewing skills
 - o Hounds4Hire is Loyola's online job/internship search engine
 - o Employers interview undergrads for jobs/internships in the office
 - o Alumni networking is available through Hounds4Hire
- Music Department located on ground floor
 - o Practice rooms
 - o Recital/piano rooms
 - o Private voice and instrument lesson rooms
 - o Instrument storage

- Studio Art and Photography Studios on upper floors
 - O Darkroom, film developing areas, and studio space available for all students in photography courses 24/7

McManus Theater (23)

- Venue for plays and musicals, held year round
- Fine arts performances (solo and ensembles)
- Student theater groups, the Poisoned Cup Players and Evergreen Players perform here
- Loyola's male (Chimes) and female (Belles) *a capella* groups perform their concerts, Chordbusters, here, and they sell out every semester!

Julio Fine Arts Gallery (23)

• Student and professional art work is displayed throughout the year

Post Office (23)

- Student mailboxes are combination locked, students keep same mailbox all four years
- Fully functioning Post Office, open Monday through Friday

Reitz Arena (23)

- Home of Men's and Women's Basketball and Women's Volleyball home games
- Venue for concerts, comedians and campus-wide events such as Relay for Life

Andrew White Student Center (24)

- ALANA Services (Association for African, Latin, Asian and Native American Students)
- Fine Arts and Communication wing
 - o Black box theater
 - o Mac labs
 - o Professors' offices and classrooms
- Cyber Café
- Barnes & Noble Bookstore, 2nd Floor
- McGuire Hall, 2nd Floor, lectures and events venue
- Student Activities Office, 3rd Floor
- Athletics Office, 3rd Floor
- Reading Room, 3rd Floor, student lounge and study area. Venue for Thursday night coffee house programs
- Leadership and New Student Programs, 4th Floor

Boulder Garden Café (24)

- First floor of Andrew White Student Center
- New dining facilities, including Ikigaii sushi, Mein Bowl Asian Cuisine, and Moe's Southwest Grill
- One of the two main dining facilities on campus
- Students can use their debit-style meal account here
- Ample seating; a popular place for students to gather

Diane Geppi-Aikens Field (25)

- Former site of varsity soccer and lacrosse practices and home games
- One of the largest Astroturf surfaces in the country

Library Atrium (44)

- Renovated and reopened Fall 2008
 - o Renovations include expansion, additional shelving, seating space, computer workstations, a cyber café, an auditorium, and group meeting rooms
- Shared with College of Notre Dame of Maryland
- Open from 8 a.m. to 2 a.m. on weekdays; 24 hours during final exams
- In addition to the hundreds of thousands of volumes in the library, we also have a consortium with local colleges to share resources
- During the academic year, librarians are available through online chat on the library website to answer questions and help with research
- Large online database collection

*Ridley Athletic Complex (RAC)

• 2.5 miles off-campus; (located on West Cold Spring Lane, immediately after the Route 83 exits) 6,000-seat stadium style arena for varsity lacrosse and soccer, campus shuttles take students back and forth from complex to campus
