OAR offers community-managed programs in Arlington County, the Cities of Alexandria and Falls Church as well as Washington DC, aimed at restoring offenders to the community as productive and responsible citizens.</p> <p>Alternative sentencing options help reduce overcrowding of local jails and provide services to community organizations. Programs for incarcerated individuals and ex-offenders reduce recidivism, expand career options, build family stability, and enhance community life. Coordination with state and local criminal justice agencies facilitates the delivery of exceptional jail-based programs and assists probationers and parolees in meeting their community supervision obligations. Interns work with our legal staff to help process requests for legal assistance by fielding phone calls, helping with general case investigation and research, and providing general office support. Start/end dates and hours are flexible. We prefer a commitment of at least 8 hours/week for at least 10 weeks during the school year. Summer interns are expected to work at least 2 or 3 days a week; full-time interns are preferred.</p> <p>The ACLU-MD seeks interns with excellent research and writing skills, a commitment to public interest work, and a healthy sense of humor. Candidates with office experience will be given preference. We expect interns to be comfortable communicating with clients from a variety of socio-economic backgrounds with a wide range of needs.</p> <p>Interested applicants should send a resume, short writing sample (1-2 pages) and a cover letter explaining why you want to intern with the ACLU-MD and what sort of time commitment you can offer. It should highlight what you can offer the ACLU and let us know whether there are any issues you are particularly interested in.</p> <p>Recommended application deadlines: Fall (Sept. 15); Spring (Dec. 1); Summer (Apr. 1).
