

### **Letter from the Director**

Dear friends of the Karson Institute.



Founded in October 2020, the Karson Institute for Race, Peace & Social Justice provides a scholarly space for professors, students, social justice workers, and activists to come together to research, discuss, debate, and explore answers to America's most urgent questions on inequality, injustice, and racial inequity. We know that as a nation, we are stronger together. Still, decades of racial injustice, social inequity, and systemic acts of violence against the Black and Brown community have separated us. Throughout history, there have been moments of awakening where we have taken up these broader questions and attempted to settle them; but, we have found that moments can only lead to movements when there is an infrastructure in place to support operationalizing the work.

We believe that we are in the midst of one of those moments and that The Institute will be a place to house the research, train our students, and operationalize the movement for racial and social justice. Our goals are to tell the stories that led us to this moment and capture the currently described stories. Granted, some of these stories are not new; indeed, America has a long and complicated history of wrestling with the questions of racism and white supremacy; but, our goal is to capture them and share them with our institution, Baltimore City and the world. As an institution, Loyola has long been committed to addressing these difficult questions and providing opportunities to implement solutions.

During the COVID shutdown, the Karson Institute hosted virtual conversations about race and social justice virtually and on campus. We successfully launched three Centers: the Center for Public Engagement; the Center for Research and Culture; and the Center for Teaching and Learning to contribute to the social discourse and academia of racial equity and social justice and incorporated Spanish translations for our culturally and linguistically diverse audiences.

We named María T. Colompos-Tohtsonie as the Institute's inaugural doctoral fellow and Senior Fellows Rev. Dr. Van B. Gayton and William H. Murphy, Jr. These three have reinvigorated how we explore the topics of inequality, injustice, and racial inequality. We selected our first education partner, City Neighbors High School. Even with all of our work, we still have much work to do, and that work is made possible by the Karson Team: Colompos-Tohtsonie, MPPA and Courtney Carroll, who work behind the scenes with grace and skill to make sure things run smoothly. As we celebrate our first anniversary, we are delighted to begin Year Two of our Master Plan. I invite you to join with us and lean into this Karson moment of change.

#### **COMloquium Series**

The COMloquium Series are monthly conversations hosted by Dr. Wise Whitehead in conversation with a guest(s) discussing relevant and timely issues around racial, social, and healing justice. The goals are to provide a starting point for engaging with these issues, both on campus and around the country; explore solutions on how to foster understanding of the causes and consequences of systematic sources of injustice; analyze the inter-relationship between race and social justice; and, identify and discuss potential strategies for resolving violent conflict and building and sustaining peace. #### **City Neighbors High School**

The Karson Institute selected City Neighbors High School\* in Baltimore, MD as our inaugural KI Education partner. Under the direction of Dr. Wise Whitehead, teachers and staff will spend the year being trained in culturally responsive teaching and instruction; racial equity training, and the social construction of race; creating and maintaining classrooms of excellence and exclusion; and, curriculum and lesson plan development. The training has been custom designed to support the equity and inclusion initiative already happening at CNHS. City Neighbors High School is a public charter high school located in the Glenham-Benhar neighborhood of Baltimore, Maryland, United States. Opened in 2010, City Neighbors High was the third school launched by the larger City Neighbors Foundation program, a Baltimore-based charter organization. # **Center for Public Engagement**

he Center for Public Engagement (CPE), which is the most active center within the Karson Institute, aims to provide a conversational space to discuss relevant and timely issues around racial, social, and healing justice by hosting a wide range of dialogue sessions.

People of all backgrounds are encouraged to join in on these important conversations to expand their knowledge of race and diversity within the United States.

The CPE consists of authors, activists, artists, columnists, scientists, politicians, community leaders, scholars, government

officials, and policy practitioners who contribute to the social discourse of racial equity and social justice.

The CPE includes the following:

- A starting point for engaging racial inequalities and systemic oppression, both on campus and throughout the United States.
- An opportunity to explore solutions on how to foster understanding of the causes and consequences of systematic sources of injustice.
- Pathways to analyzing the intricacies between race and social justice by scaffolding oral histories.

- · Identifying potential strategies for resolving violent conflict and sustaining peaceful accords.
- Providing a conversational space to discuss relevant and timely issues around racial, social, and healing justice.
- Presenting onthly dialogue sessions, including the COMloquium series, Koffee & Konvo lunchtime talks, and Student Talk Backs, with scholars, selected guests, and faculty members.



### **Center for Research and Culture**

he Center for Research and
Culture (CRC), provides a
scholarly space for researchers
that fosters collaboration among
scholars across numerous
disciplines to address the needs of
operationalization for racial and social
justice.

By providing a forum for collaborative scholarship and instruction, the CRC stimulates research and engages with scholars to integrate and increase knowledge bases of race, social justice, and peace within the United States.

The CRC consists of research fellows, research assistants, and undergraduate and graduate students who conduct and support empirical research on a variety of issues that lie at the intersection of race, social justice, peace, education, and advocacy movements in the United States. The CRC advances research that illuminates the causes, consequences, and potential means of ameliorating racial injustice, social inequity, and systemic acts of violence. The CRC brings together education scholars from the following disciplines:

The Karson Institute Senior Research Fellowship is specifically designed for senior scholars and professionals to come together to research, explore and build upon the equity, diversity, and inclusion work that they have done, either in the academy or in their field. The Karson Institute's Senior Research Fellows are scholars of national or international acclaim who are researching race, peace, or social justice issues. They will be in residence at the Karson Institute for the current academic year and will present two lectures during the year that will be open to the public to discuss their research. The Karson Institute Doctoral Research Fellowship embodies doctoral candidates and students who conduct research and cultivate knowledge networks in establishing a research and data-driven scholarly environment.







# **Center for Teaching and Learning**

he Center for Teaching and Learning (CTL), works to help educators and administrators throughout the United States excel in their teaching, to enhance the culture of teaching, and, in turn, to increase the sociocultural perspectives of education. The CTL focuses on integrating the following aspects in effective teaching methodologies:

• Critical Race Theory: by recognizing that racism is embedded within educational systems and institutions that replicate racial inequality and embracing the lived experiences of people of color within scholarly spaces.

- K-12 Program and Development
- that focuses on creating professional development materials and resources for educators and administrators to effectively integrate critical race theory into culturally responsive instruction. The work is:
- Student-Centered: by fortifying culturally responsive teaching techniques and positioning learners at the core of effective course design, including learning objectives and assessments.
- Evidence-based: by identifying and disseminating teaching professional development strategies supported by empirical research.

- Equitable and Inclusive: by implementing universal design principles, advocating for sociocultural perspectives within learning spaces, and understanding the effectiveness of equity, diversity, and inclusion policy audits.
- Actionable: by reinvigorating practical teaching and learning strategies that foster educator development and spark genius amongst scholars.

### **Acomplishments**

During the last year, the CTL achieved the following:

- The Karson Institute partnered with Ms. Magazine, Ms. Magazine in the Classroom, and the National Women's Studies Association to create a critical race theory primer (released on October 15)
- The Karson Institute started monthly professional development training with the staff and teachers at City Neighbors High School.
- Our Doctoral Fellow (Colompos-Tohtsonie) made policy recommendations in the field of culturally responsive teaching practices for teachers of
- students who have different sociocultural backgrounds and created a equity, diversity, and inclusion (EDI) policy audit for schools to implement.
- The Karson Institute, in partnership with ASALH, will edit the 85th anniversary edition for the Black History Bulletin.







## Karsonya Wise Whitehead, Ph.D. **Biography**

Dr. Karsonya "Kaye" Wise Whitehead is an associate professor of communication and African and African American Studies at Loyola University Maryland and the founding director of The Karson Institute for Race, Peace & Social Justice. She is the host of the award-winning radio show Today with Dr. Kave on WEAA, 88.9 FM and the 2021 recipient of a Regional Edward R. Murrow Award for Excellence in Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion.

She is the author of four books, including Race-Brave: new and selected works; Notes from a Colored Girl: The Civil War Pocket Diaries of Emilie Frances Davis, which received both the 2015 Darlene Clark Hine Book Award from the Organization of American Historians and the 2014 Letitia Woods Brown Book Award from the Association of Black Women Historians; and Letters to My Black Sons: Raising Boys in a Post-Racial America. She is a K-12 master teacher in African American history; an award-winning curriculum writer and lesson plan developer; and an award-winning former Baltimore City middle school teacher.

In 2021, Dr. Whitehead was selected by the Baltimore Business Journal to receive the Leaders in Diversity Award. In 2020, Dr. Whitehead was selected by The Daily Record as one of Maryland's Top 100 Women. In 2019, she received the Collegium Visionary Award from the College of Holy Cross; the Exceptional Merit in Media Award (EMMA) from the National Women's Political Caucus; the

Baltimore Sun named her as one of Baltimore's 25 "Women to Watch in 2019"; and Essence magazine included her on the 2019 "Woke 100 List," of "black women advocating for change." As one of only a few daily drive-time afternoon radio shows hosted by a black woman, Today with Dr. Kaye received the 2021 and 2020 Chesapeake Associated Press Award for Outstanding Editorial or Commentary; the 2019 Chesapeake Associated Press Award for Outstanding Talk Show, and the second place Award for Outstanding Editorial or Commentary. In 2020, the Baltimore Sun selected Dr. Kaye as the Best Radio

In February 2016, Dr. Whitehead received the Joan B. Kroc's Institute for International Peace Studies "Distinguished Alumni" Award for her work as a peace activist, scholar, filmmaker, writer, and poet. In 2014, she received the 2014 Lifetime Achievement Award from the Progressive National Baptist Convention (PNBC); was selected as one of the top 25 women professors in Maryland by Online Schools Maryland; and in 2013, received Loyola University Maryland's Faculty Award for Excellence in Engaged Scholarship for her work documenting the stories of women who are temporarily experiencing homelessness.

Dr. Whitehead also received the 2006 Gilder Lehrman Preserve America Maryland History Teacher of the Year Award (sponsored by the Gilder Lehrman Institute of American History CONTINUED...

and the Maryland State Department of Education); was one of 50 alumni to receive the Distinguished Black Alumni Award from the University of Notre Dame, Indiana (2005); and was a winner of both the Langston Hughes, David Diop, Etheridge Knight Poetry Award (1999, 2000) and the Zora Neale Hurston Creative Writing Award (1998) from the Gwendolyn Brooks Creative Writing Center at the University of Chicago.

Prior to her work in academia, Dr. Whitehead was a documentary filmmaker with MetroTV, a PBS-affiliate, and a senior producer for Music Television Networks (MTV). In 2001, she directed and produced Twin Towers: A History, a documentary film that describes the technical problems that were overcome and challenges the ironworkers faced in constructing the landmark buildings, and recounts the daredevil stunts that the buildings attracted. The film was nominated for an Emmy in 2002-Dr. Whitehead's third nomination. It has since become the second-largest selling film about 9/11 and airs regularly on PBS stations around the country.

Dr. Whitehead writes a bi-monthly column, "Conversations with Dr. Kaye," for the Baltimore Afro newspaper based upon her deep ethnographic study within the Black Butterfly neighborhoods of Baltimore City. She is also one of the most sought-after keynote speakers in the country, having given over 500 keynotes worldwide.
