As the LCC enters our next decade, we take time to reflect on the impact we have had on so many clients, families, and graduate students. Since opening in 2003, more than 3,000 graduate students have provided services to nearly 38,000 clients, and the work continues. This past year, the LCC billed \$535,000 and discounted \$340,000 of services, evidence of our commitment to providing access to care for all. At the core of this is the understanding that serving the underserved is our mission, and training graduate students to infuse this into their clinical education is essential as they grow into future healthcare professionals. Our programs embody the mission and vision of the LCC and provide support for marginalized populations across the greater Baltimore communities.

As we join Loyola University's *Together We Rise* strategic plan, we are highlighting programs in our annual report that exemplify our mission in action. Our talented clinical faculty bring more than 300 years of clinical experience to their teaching, and have a combined 150+ years at Loyola, a testament to their commitment to the Ignatian principles of *cura personalis* and

MENTAL HEALTH PROGRAM

In keeping with our comprehensive approach to wellness, the LCC provides well-rounded care to account for various factors contributing to psychological difficulties, enabling individuals to have more fulfilling relationships, be more successful at work and school, and improve their overall quality of life.

Our specialized Grief & Trauma program impacts underserved populations of Baltimore who have suffered trauma from experiences ranging from socio-engineered trauma to grief and loss. Through philanthropic support, we are able to provide fee-waived grief and trauma services, ensuring access to care for all remains the driving force.





ACQURIED BRAIN INJURY PROGRAM

The Acquired Brain Injury (ABI) Program is a unique interprofessional assessment and treatment program serving the diverse cognitive, communication, and psychosocial needs of adults with acquired brain injury and disease. Our clients typically have neurological disorders resulting from stroke, traumatic brain injury, and progressive neurological disease.

• 68 individual clients in the ABI program received a combination of 1,739 sessions over three semesters, including our Intensive Treatment for Aphasia Program (ITAP), a two-day, 9-week intensive summer program comprised of individual, group, and community-based activities.

VOICE CLINIC

The LCC offers services for adults and children who seek voice and communication training. Along with evaluating and treating a variety of voice disorders, the LCC aims to be a community-based resource that offers a safe and supportive setting for all individuals along the gender spectrum as they explore voice and communication changes that more fully align with their gender identity and/or expression. We also offer specialized voice therapy services targeting optimal vocal health and function for voice professionals, singers, and performers.
