



Spotlight Events at Loyola College

Every year, across all divisions, Loyola College welcomes major scholars, scientists, writers, and scholars to campus. These speakers bring their insights and findings to events that both enlighten and challenge students and faculty and are foundational to the College's mission to advance the liberal arts and sciences. This past year was no different. Among the varied programming across the College, there were three spotlight events.

The Hanway Lecture in Global Studies

This year's lecture featured Steven Levitsky and Daniel Ziblatt, Harvard University political scientists who spoke about their book, *How Democracies Die*, to an audience in attendance in McGuire Hall and virtually. The format was innovative as two current juniors in global studies, **Juan Lopez**, '24 (global studies), and **Bethlehem Eshetu**, '24 (global studies), interviewed the authors. Grand Seminar

In November, Kartik Chandran, Ph.D., professor of earth and environmental engineering at Columbia University, delivered the Grand Seminar lecture. He is a global leader in sustainable wastewater treatment and engineered resource recovery. Chandran's work is focused on understanding and harnessing the biochemical potential and metabolism of microbial communities and developing appropriate technologies for addressing global environmental needs. Letter from the Associate Dean




Despite the challenges that face Humanities Departments across the nation, there is much to celebrate here in the Humanities at Loyola. The number of students majoring in the Humanities

Humanities Highlights

The Department of Modern Languages and

Literatures implemented a new Collaborative and Online International Learning project, called Virtual Learning Exchange. The program matches Loyola students with students in other countries via Zoom, where students take turns speaking in their respective target languages. Spanish students at Loyola met with students from Jesuit universities throughout Latin America, while French students spoke with Haitian students studying in the Dominican Republic.

The Department of Visual and Performing Arts

hosted a lecture in November on "Webb's First Look at the Universe." This event was a collaborative effort co-sponsored by the fine arts, physics, and natural and applied sciences departments. Joseph DePasquale, senior data imaging developer at the Space Telescope Science Institute, discussed his experience taking data gathered by the James Webb Telescope and reconstructing it into stunning images of the cosmos. In addition, the department secured a \$25,000 grant from Rockley Foundation to upgrade keyboards for student classes over the next five years.

The **History Department** launched a new firstyear class that will replace the traditional regional surveys as the required first-year core class. HS 100: Encounters with the Past is designed as an introduction to the field of history. Students are introduced to what it means to think like a historian, how to ask critical questions, to evaluate evidence, to make persuasive arguments, and to write clearly and cogently.

Among the featured authors in the **Writing Department**'s Modern Masters series was Ocean Vuong. The novelist and poet, a 2019 MacArthur Award winner, read from his newest collection of poems, *Time is a Mother* (Penguin, 2022).

Center for the Humanities

The Center for the Humanities remains a vital part of intellectual life on the Evergreen campus, supporting a variety of student research projects and internships, faculty research and teaching, programing for individual departments, and larger campus-wide events.

The Center inaugurated a "Humanities in Action" event in the fall. Legal commentator and author Elie Mystal spoke to a crowd of 300 on the Constitution and the right to privacy in the wake of the Supreme Court's *Dobbs* decision.

David Carey, Ph.D., and **Lisa Zimmerelli, Ph.D.**, taught two connected Aperio seminars that investigated Loyola's ties to slavery and the legacy of racism on the campus across the 19th and 20th centuries. Twenty students presented their work at a packed community forum in the fall. The essays and creative works that emerged from those classes is forthcoming from Loyola's Apprentice House.

Finally, the Center sponsored four student fellows (all majoring in a humanities discipline) and two faculty members to participate in a week-long course in June at the Digital Humanities Summer Institute at the University of Victoria, British Columbia.

NAS Student and Faculty Highlights

STUDENTS

Kudos to **Raenita Fenner, Ph.D.**, chair of Loyola's Engineering Department, and students **Emily Hunt, '23** (mechanical/ materials engineering), and **Abby Lambert, '24** (philosophy). They represented Loyola in Lockheed Martin's two-day Engineering Ethics Competition in March, securing an impressive second place among 71 competing schools at Lockheed Martin's Bethesda headquarters.

In the 2022-2023 academic year, two of our NAS student-athletes received notable recognition. **Ashley Dwyer, '23** (physics), earned the prestigious title of Patriot League Volleyball Scholar-Athlete of the Year. **Paige Sim, '23** (biology), was honored as the reigning Patriot League Goalkeeper of the Year, having also received recognition as a three-time All-Patriot League honoree and an Academic All-American. Notably, both Dwyer and Sim were also Hauber Research Fellows in 2021.

FACULTY

Theresa Nguyen, Ph.D., associate professor of chemistry and biochemistry, was honored with the Harry W. Rodgers III Distinguished Teacher of the Year Award, while **Timothy Clark, Ph.D.**, associate professor of mathematics and statistics, received the Faculty Award for Excellence in Transformative Teaching.

Four NAS faculty members received promotions: **Megan Olsen, Ph.D.**, professor of computer science, **Courtney Hastings, Ph.D.**, associate professor of chemistry and biochemistry, **Bu Hyoung Lee, Ph.D.**, associate professor of mathematics and statistics, and **Inge Heyer, Ph.D.**, teaching professor of physics.

Loyola celebrated two NAS faculty members at the recent Bene Merenti Reception. **Bernadette Roche, Ph.D.**, biology, and **Brian Barr, Ph.D.**, chemistry, were recognized at the event for their 25 years of service.

A new Bachelor of Science in Biohealth launched in 2023-24 academic year

spearheaded by biology professors Michael Tangrea, Ph.D., and Christopher Thompson, Ph.D.

Professor **David Rivers Ph.D.**, is serving as the chair of the newly established Department of Forensic Science.

Loyola has been awarded a \$1.2 million National Science Foundation grant for its Culturally Responsive Equitable STEM Teaching (CREST) program, funded over five years through the NSF's Robert Noyce Teacher Scholarship Program. This grant will support teacher candidates in developing the skills needed to excel as highly qualified STEM educators in high-needs schools. The Principal Investigator (PI) for the Novce grant is Timothy Clark, Ph.D., associate professor of mathematics and statistics, with Afra Hersi, Ph.D., dean of the School of Education, Qi Shi, Ph.D., director of the Center for Equity, Leadership, and Social Justice in Education, and associate professor of school counseling, and Stacy Williams, chair of the Teacher Education Department, serving as Co-PIs.

Adam Phillippy, '02, received the 2022 NAS Alumni Award during our Grand Seminar reception. Phillippy was named one of *Time Magazine*'s "Most Influential People of 2022" for his exceptional work on the Human Genome project. Phillippy began his research as a Hauber Research Fellow at Loyola when he conducted a project titled, "Efficiently Computing Whole Genome Alignments," which was guided by professor **Arthur Delcher**.



The "Data Science in Everyday Life: Applicability, AI, and Other Trends" panel discussion took place on campus in October 2022. The keynote address was delivered by **David Norton, MBA '95**, a distinguished industry executive and former Harrah's CMO. The panelists offered diverse insights into data science, addressing its everyday life applications, global AI utilization, and emerging data science trends, spanning both industry and government sectors.



In March, the 2023 NAS Student Excellence event took place, honoring four distinguished groups of student scholars. These groups include: the 2023 Choudhury Sarkar-Dey Graduating Medalists, the 2023 graduating Haig Scholars, the 2023 graduating Hauber Fellows, and the 2023 graduating CPaMS scholars. We were delighted to have both President **Terrence M. Sawyer, J.D.**, and Provost **Cheryl Moore-Thomas, Ph.D., NCC**, in attendance.



The Celebration of Science Week occurred from March 27-31. This event encompassed a variety of workshops, lectures, and interactive sessions. Notable features included popup classes, an IEEE Club demo, a Robotics Club demo, discussions on Copyright for Creators, speed mentoring sessions with the Society of Women Engineers, a display of the BAJA Motorsports Club racing car, and engaging microbial art activities.



We welcomed our largest and most diverse class of 34 CPaMS Scholars, marking our most competitive year with the highest applicant numbers in history. CPaMS Scholars fosters a close-knit community for students majoring in computer science, mathematics, statistics, data science, or physics. Scholars share specific activities and courses, supported by mentors and advisors. Learn more at **loyola.edu/cpams**.



The Health Outreach Baltimore program, which continued its impactful partnership with Mercy Medical Center for its ninth year. The Pre-Health community now boasts nine clubs, including the Pre-Health Society, Society for Underrepresented Pre-Health Students, and Doctors without Borders. Impressive acceptance rates in a variety of medical fields have been achieved at levels well above the national averages.

Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN)

Loyola officially submitted a proposal to the Maryland Higher Education Commission (MHEC) for the introduction of a Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN). Pending additional approvals and accreditation, this program will be developed in partnership with Mercy Medical Center, which will offer clinical placements at its downtown Baltimore campus, along with additional resources and assistance. The new program will be part of the NAS division, and will benefit from the expertise of **Maiju Lehmijoki Wetzel**, **Ph.D.**, director of Pre-Health Programs, while the Department of Biology is serving as its initial academic home.

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Letter from the Associate Dean



Loyola's social sciences faculty and students wrestled with texts and conducted research and clinical interventions to understand and promote human and societal flourishing. Innovations in

learning abounded with a revised sociology curriculum, additional research practicum track for psychology honors, and a flexible and rigid videostroboscopy speech pathology service at the Loyola Clinical Centers. The Dean's office supported six students in research assistantships and one for a summer fellowship during the 2022-23 year.

Significant milestones also occurred for two departments. Psychology anniversaries were celebrated with the 25th Psy.D. program reception, a continuing education workshop hosted by **Jeff Lating, Ph.D.**, and a 50th departmental anniversary dinner in which Distinguished Alumni Impact Awards were given. Thereafter, a Commitment to Justice Award supporting graduate students interested in clinical work with marginalized and vulnerable populations was launched. After 40 years, the Columbia location of the Loyola Clinical Centers (LCC) closed; a gathering of faculty, students, and clients occurred to pay tribute to the work and community. In turn, the Belvedere Square location of the LCC was expanded and renovated during 2023.

Additionally, alumni engagement continued with guest speakers, career nights, and the launch of a political newsletter. The annual Mental Health and Well-Being Continuing Education event featured **Janine Domingues, M.S. '07, Ph.D. '05**, who discussed evidence-based mental health services for students in schools with 62 faculty, students, and alumni.

Assistant Professor **Joan Ricart-Huguet**, **Ph.D.**, (political science) received a \$9,000 grant from the Institute for Human Studies, George Mason University, in fall 2022.

Loyola Ready



Pre-law students visited Gordon Feinblatt, where **Searle Mitnick**, **J.D., '66**, chair of Loyola's Pre-Law Advisory Board, hosted President **Terrence M. Sawyer, J.D.**, current students, faculty, and administrators for a panel discussion and networking event. Earlier in the year, they also visited a Baltimore federal courthouse, watched a sentencing hearing, and met with varied professionals in the legal field.



Speech pathology masters and psychology doctoral students collaborated with Notre Dame Maryland University undergraduate nursing students in a simulation lab. Speech pathology M.S. students acted as patients and explained how to communicate with aphasia patients. Psy.D. students demonstrated psych screeners, and nursing students demonstrated patient care and non-oral feeding via a nasogastric tube on the high-fidelity manikins.



Seventeen global studies seniors presented six group capstone projects as part of Academic Excellence weekend. Their projects required them to engage in scholarly research to assist a community partner (Rendez-vous: Haiti, The Sixth Branch, the Baltimore City's Mayor's Office, Esperanza Center, and Immigration Outreach Service Center) on a global issue e.g., immigration, sexual awareness, urban food deserts, and Haitian poverty.







Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Engagement

Social sciences continued to foster training on inclusive teaching and clinical practice this past year. Psychology held its third annual DEI colloquium, featuring Mateo Cruz, Ph.D., and Yaro Fong-Olivares, Psy.D., (Bentley University) on intersectionality, given to 150 faculty and students. The departmental DEI committee also launched a diversity library with inclusive teaching resources. In addition, faculty mentored DEI-related research including juvenile justice and sleep, e.g., Amy Wolfson, Ph.D., co-presented with 10 psychology undergraduate students at the annual Johns Hopkins Sleep & Circadian Research Day.

Additionally, social sciences strengthened their curricular and co-curricular DEI opportunities. For instance, Carsten Vala, **Ph.D.**, taught Politics and Globalization of Taiwan during Maymester 2023. The course explored democracy, faith, and capital themes, and included field trips (human rights and democracy activist meetings, and tours of Buddhist and Christian sites and a semiconductor manufacturing company). Also, students engaged in justice work, including volunteering at our Govans' expungement clinics, wherein 81 clients were served and 108 petitions were filed for the September and March clinics. This success resulted in

the University receiving the Community Partner for Justice Award from Maryland Legal Aid's Equal Justice Council at a ceremony on May 16, 2023. In Speech-Language-Hearing Sciences, **Brianne Roos, Ed.D.**, launched a new faculty onboarding pilot program, which will be incorporated in university-wide new faculty orientation this year. Additionally, the voice clinic within the Loyola Clinical Centers was re-established and now includes gender affirming voice and communication services.
