
Alpha Kappa Psi (Business Fraternity)


I have been a member of AKPsi since my freshman year and can't believe I'm already at my last semester here at Loyola.

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Interview Tips

Online/Zoom Interviews

- Choose a background with not much going on that could distract the interviewer.
- Check your audio/video before logging on for the interview to prevent any technology problems.
- Try to look at the camera so you maintain good eye contact with the interviewer instead of looking at yourself.
- Practice having good body language and seem engaged to show your interest in the company.

Interview Preparation

- Come prepared with questions to ask.
- Research the firm or company to add to your answers or use for questions at the end to further show your interest.
- Some of these interviews are behavioral based, so have times that you have showed leadership, teamwork where you might have had to overcome someone that didn't pull their weight, and how you deal with time management.
- Know your resume as they will have it in front of them and anything on it could be asked about.

Previously Asked Questions

- Tell me about yourself. (This is where you would give your 'elevator pitch.')
- Where did you hear about us and why are you interested in this job/internship? (This is where your research will come into play.)
- Was there a time where you found yourself dealing with a team member who wasn't doing their job and how did you communicate with this team member to motivate them? (This is where one of those experiences could be used.)
- If you could have a superpower, what would it be? (Be confident! Could lead to a great conversation.)
